

Report Summary

This document highlights Blackhawk Hills' major goals and initiatives for 2012-2013. The document addresses the organization's transition to a regional council, topics of multi-jurisdictional concern, and funding distributions.

Major Goals

Over the past year, Blackhawk Hills' initiatives focused on the following region-wide goals:

- Encourage Long Term Regional Comprehensive Planning
 Regional plans are essential to attracting growth and preserving resources. Blackhawk
 Hills works with federal and state agencies to promote and develop regional plans.
- Assist with Infrastructure and Capital Improvement Planning
 Plans at the local level support community development and outline timelines for improving and replacing infrastructure. Blackhawk Hills leverages funds for planning and ensures that suitable projects receive support.
- Support Economic, Community, and Workforce Development
 Recognizing people and location-based elements of development is critical. The partnerships that Blackhawk Hills establishes help the six counties invest in both human and
 community resources.
- Support Natural Resources Preservation and Conservation
 Initiatives that both recognize the region's physical beauty and support the efficient use of resources ensure that future generations may maintain a certain quality of life. Black hawk Hills-sponsored conferences and discussions address significant environmental and recreational concerns.
- Support Entrepreneurship, Innovation, and Collaboration
 Working with public and private sector officials to plan and encourage collaboration helps
 the entire region share in the benefits of development and resource-pooling. Round
 tables and meetings with officials maintain intergovernmental relationships and spread
 knowledge beyond local geographies.

The mission of Blackhawk Hills Regional Council is to assist the people and local agencies of Northwest Illinois in developing and implementing a regional outlook that will enhance economic growth, workforce development, and quality of life for local communities through leadership, program and project development, planning, and leveraging of resources.

THE BLACKHAWK HILLS REGIONAL COUNCIL

The Blackhawk Hills Regional Council (formally known as Blackhawk Hills RC&D) serves the region as an Economic Development District (EDD). The EDD was established under criteria of the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration (EDA) in 1992. The purpose of the program is to accelerate overall economic development program planning on a regional basis and to utilize all applicable federal, state, and local agencies, groups, and organizations in implementing the plan(s).

The Blackhawk Hills Resource Conservation and Development Area (RC&D), was authorized in March 1974 by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture and quickly became a not-for-profit 501(c)3 organization sponsored by the local County Boards and Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) Boards, which has transformed into who we are today. The Blackhawk Hills area is a 3,777.8 square mile region that consists of the six north-western counties of the State of Illinois (Carroll, Jo Daviess, Lee, Ogle, Stephenson, and Whiteside), and has a combined population of 235,689.

The council is governed by an 18-member Council, which is made up of one representative from each of the local sponsors (County Boards and County SWCD Boards) and one area representative from each county (appointed by the two sponsors).

The Council pursues its mission by hosting or facilitating more than 140 meetings annually with federal, state and local leaders. Issues include, but are not limited to; land management, business development, transportation, neighborhood preservation, health, the environment, taxes, legislation, economic development, recreation, land conservation, agriculture, forestry, emergency services, water quality/management and education. These topics are addressed using a network of agencies, organizations and individuals that consists of more than 600 volunteers, and it's growing each year.

Blackhawk Hills provides the following services and/or assistance.

BLACKHAWK HILLS AS THE EDD

In response to tough economic times suffered in the 1980s, the original RC&D Council expanded and diversified into sponsoring economic development programs. In 1989, the six standalone county redevelopment areas formed a coalition with the RC&D Council to establish an Economic Development District under criteria set forth by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration (EDA). In 1992, the EDA formally recognized the Blackhawk Hills RC&D area as an Economic Development District.

The focus that the Council has adopted for economic development issues is to

- I) promote the importance of the planning process to facilitate positive feedback and desire able economic growth within the individual committee of the Council
- 2) assemble and implement a regional plan based on the needs of the communities within the region
- 3) provide technical assistance to the communities in the District by connecting local people with specific projects to appropriate local, state and federal offices
- 4) provide assistance in various grant or loan applications
- 5) provide support for communities in the form of statistical, demographic and economic data

COMPREHENSIVE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY (CEDS)

In order to assure that economic development initiatives come from the communities, the Council requires each participating county to participate in the regional Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) planning process. The CEDS committee consists of a chairperson and a variety of volunteers recruited for their various economic interests and pursuits.

The CEDS Committee works to ascertain the needs of the individual counties and communities. The chairpersons of each county committee, along with other regional economic development leaders then gather to form the Regional CEDS Committee project list. Bi-monthly Regional CEDS Committee meetings are the forum to discuss each county's concerns and needs, and allow for networking and the exchange of information. This structure allows the Regional Council and the CEDS Committees to coordinate efforts to promote regional economic development.

In the upcoming year, it continues to be our mission to encourage every county in the Black-hawk Hills region to become more actively involved in their county CEDS planning process. It is our goal to help each county recognize the need to begin fostering a more encompassing, county-wide economic development planning initiative in partnership with the Blackhawk Hills Regional Council.

Management and Planning of the Economic Development Administration District

Blackhawk Hills was designated as an Economic Development District (EDD) by the Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration (EDA) in March 1992. As such, Blackhawk Hills is responsible for the management and planning of the EDD, which includes updating and maintaining the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) document. The EDA CEDS 5-Year Report has been adopted by our council and submitted for the time period 2008-2013. An annual update has also been approved and submitted for the current year.

The Regional CEDS Committee meets every quarter with an average of 20 to 25 participants from the region. These meetings are used to give updates on the broadband initiative, on funding from the USDA and other sources, and on regional projects and issues. This past year, we have offered presentations from the University of Illinois Extension, iFiber, and the Quad Cities Regional Economic Development Authority.

Staff regularly attends the County CEDS Committee meetings that are held at the local level in the individual counties. Participants at the county CEDS meetings help share information at a local level and give updates on projects and initiatives our office is undertaking. These meetings are held monthly or bi-monthly, depending on the county administering the meeting.

Other regional meetings we host include the County Board Chairman's meeting and the County Zoning Administrators meetings. These meetings help officials share information and discuss current issues the region may be facing. These meetings are bi-monthly and very well attended. Staff is also bringing back the Regional GIS and IT meetings to address technological and logistical issues. These meetings all serve as a way for Blackhawk Hills to determine what the current needs are within our region and what type of assistance may be required at local and regional levels.

Five County Economic Study and Recovery Plan



An application was submitted to the Economic Development Administration (EDA) in September 2011 to conduct a study on labor shed and cluster analysis, wages, and underemployment levels Outreach, Engagement, and Information Technologies for the counties of Carroll, Lee, Ogle, and Whiteside. Stephenson

County has also contributed funds to the project in order to be included in portions of the study which is being managed by the Northern Illinois University Center for Governmental Studies.

The goal of the study is to obtain information on what types of businesses our area should be attempting to attract to the region based on what resources and labor base we have to support those businesses. The study is in reaction to layoffs and industrial closings that have occurred throughout the region. The EDA has funded the project and an advisory committee consisting of at least one economic development representative from each of the counties involved are steering the parameters of the survey. Blackhawk Hills staff is participating on this advisory committee.


Becoming a Regional Council

Following the loss of Resource Conservation and Development funding, Blackhawk Hills began the process of becoming a Regional Council. As Blackhawk Hills Regional Council, we will continue to be a multi-service entity with state and locally-defined boundaries that delivers a variety of local, state, and federal programs. The designation allows us to offer expanded services related to comprehensive planning, grant administration, data research, mapping, and technical assistance.

Regional Councils can enhance the economic competitiveness of a region and help strengthen the national economy as a whole. They have recently become more prominent in receiving federal and state aid for their regions. Certain programs and projects in which state or federal aid are involved must be submitted to the area's Regional Council for review in order to be considered.

According to the National Association of Regional Councils (NARC), Regional Councils were conceived in the 1960's and today are organizations skilled at providing services, creating partnerships, problem solving, and fiscal management. The role of the Regional Council has been shaped by the changing dynamics in local, state, and federal government. There is now a growing recognition that local governments must work together to resolve social and environmental challenges in their regions.

As of April 2012, all six counties that Blackhawk Hills serves approved the change to Regional Council status. Blackhawk Hills will now be known as Blackhawk Hills Regional Council. Please refer to the organization chart below for the structuring of the organization.



Assist with Infrastructure and Capital Improvement Planning

- Rochelle Project E-Rail

Rochelle Project E-Rail

An application was submitted to the Economic Development Administration (EDA) and approved for the City of Rochelle in the amount of \$2.4 million. This project consisted of improving the municipal water, sanitary sewer, communications and electric utilities, as well as expanding the Rochelle Dual Access Railroad.

The Project Benefit Area consists of 540 acres of land located in the southeast corner of the City of Rochelle. Although this land is close to I-88, I-39, and the Union Pacific Railroad's Global III inter-modal facility, the acreage surrounding the Project Benefit Area lacks the essential infrastructure to allow for it to reach its development potential.

The new facilities will service the growing industrial area in Rochelle and is expected to help create 290 jobs and generate \$58 million in private investment, according to grantee estimates.



Local Capital Improvement Plans

Blackhawk Hills earmarked planning funds to assist six additional communities with populations of less than 5,000 to develop or update their Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). This was the second time we have offered this program to communities in our region.

To apply for the program, communities needed to submit the following items to our office: the name of the community, who would develop the plan, the approximate completion date of the plan, and the estimated total cost of developing the plan (\$3,000 minimum). The \$1,500 incentive payment was granted to the first six communities that contacted our office with their proposal and the required documentation.

The communities that participated included the cities of Byron, East Dubuque, Fulton, and Lanark and the villages of Chadwick and Orangeville. Over the two year period this program has been offered, Blackhawk Hills has assisted sixteen communities in developing a CIP.

Broadband Project

Construction on the nine county regional broadband network began in July 2011. Crews working for the Illinois Fiber Resources Group (iFiber) started in Lee County, IL, near Sublette. The project – which is funded through a variety of federal, state, and local sources – has a budget of approximately \$68.5 million. A majority of the funding (approximately \$46 million) comes from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), which is a bureau of the United States Department of Commerce. The State of Illinois also provided \$14 million in matching funds.

iFiber was established and recognized as an Illinois not-for-profit in April 2011. The organization was created to provide oversight during the network's construction and manage the system once the fiber is lit. iFiber consists of an eight member board, including two board members appointed by Blackhawk Hills. William Tonne and Samuel Newton were appointed in January 2011 to represent the six county Blackhawk Hills region. Currently, William Tonne serves as iFiber Treasurer. The remainder of the board's membership includes representatives from Northern Illinois University (2), the City of Rockford (1), Boone County (1), LaSalle County (1), and the North Central Illinois Council of Governments (NCICG) (1). The board typically meets once every month.

An official ground-breaking ceremony was held on August 29 at Sauk Valley Community College. The event included area legislators and a representative from the Illinois Governor's Office. Construction crews from three construction firms – Aldridge Electric, Kelso-Burnett, and PirTano Construction – were in attendance, along with the project's engineering firm, Baxter and Woodman.





As of April 2012, nearly 300 miles of fiber optic conduit had been installed and 150 miles of fiber leased across all nine counties – including Boone, Winnebago, and LaSalle. Outreach teams have completed initial meetings with nearly 95% of the community anchor institutions (CAIs). CAIs appearing in the grant include K-12 education, community colleges, libraries, municipal and county governments, public safety, health care, not-for-profits, and other related entities. Approximately 65% of CAIs have provided either letters of intent and/or services agreements to participate on the network.

iFiber's initial goals, which are shaped by NTIA guidance, include establishing a core network to serve the nine counties and as many CAIs as possible. These CAIs will enjoy between 400Mbps to IGbps of transport bandwidth and cloud access. After the network build-out is complete and CAIs receive service, iFiber will encourage private sector service providers to expand service options to business and residential users.

Project History

The Northwest Illinois Broadband Taskforce was established in November 2008 to address broadband challenges in the six-county Blackhawk Hills region. In 2009, Blackhawk Hills partnered with NIU and applied for Broadband Technology Opportunities Program funding in Round I – funding which was denied in January 2010. Expanding the partnership, NIU, Blackhawk Hills, the City of Rockford, Boone County, LaSalle County, and NCICG re-applied in Round 2 (March 2010). In September 2010, the partnership's application was approved, leading to the creation of iFiber.

Local Foods Initiative

The Southwestern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission recently received a Rural Business Opportunity Grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to support local food initiatives. They asked to partner with Blackhawk Hills and focus on our two northern counties of Jo Daviess and Stephenson. A number of meetings have been held in the region concerning a push to promote local foods. Blackhawk Hills, along with the University of Illinois Extension, began looking for opportunities to help coordinate all efforts to make one strong push for local foods in our region.

It continues to be a goal to increase awareness of the Market-Maker Program to local farmers and producers. This program, developed by the University of Illinois, is a web-based resource that connects farmers, fishers, processors, distributors, food



retailers, and consumers. Blackhawk Hills sees this as an economic generator for our area, as agri-tourism continues to soar in northwestern Illinois.

These meetings have opened up the doors to the possibility of working closer with the County Farm Bureaus and we continue to collaborate on many other projects concerning the economic area of local farming and community gardening.

Tri-County Opportunities Council

The Tri-County Opportunities Council (TCOC) is a Community Action Agency serving the nine Illinois counties of Bureau, Carroll, LaSalle, Lee, Marshall, Ogle, Putnam, Stark, and Whiteside. The TCOC works to focus available local, state, federal, and private resources to assist low-income individuals and families in acquiring useful skills and knowledge to gain access to new opportunities and achieve economic self-sufficiency.

The TCOC oversees the following programs: Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), Foster Grandparents, Homemakers, Head Start/Early Head Start/Migrant Head Start, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and Weatherization and Housing Program.

Julie Jacobs, Blackhawk Hills Administrations Coordinator, has served on the Governing Board of the TCOC for eight years and has served as the Board's Secretary for the last six years.

Lee County Tourism Council



Theresa Wittenauer, Economic Development Coordinator, actively serves on the Lee County Tourism Council's (LCTC) Board of Directors. For her role, she helps with the planning of events and provides technical assistance

when needed. The LCTC meets on a monthly basis and, over the past year, was primarily focused on the Reagan 100th Birthday Celebration.

Blackhawk Hills was named the 2012 Star Award at the LCTC's annual meeting which was held on April 18, 2012. Julie Jacobs, Administrations Coordinator, accepted the award on behalf of Blackhawk Hills from Diane Nicholson, Executive Director of the LCTC. We were recognized for our efforts since our inception in 1974 and for our coordination and support during the creation of the LCTC in 1988. Blackhawk Hills was also recognized for our involvement in a number of other initiatives in northwest Illinois over the past year.



The LCTC and Blackhawk Hills both work closely with the Blackhawk Waterways Convention and Visitors Bureau, a regional tourism agency.

Rock River Trail Initiative

The Rock River Trail Initiative (RRTI) was formed in 2010 to help establish a recreation water trail and a historic scenic road route along the entire length of the Rock River from its headwaters in Wisconsin to its outlet in the Mississippi River. The initiative includes promoting eco-tourism and recreational opportunities for residents and visitors. This will be done by enhancing the river's ecosystem through natural resource conservation and supporting the economic development and revitalization of communities along the river.

Theresa Wittenaur, Economic Development Coordinator, and Julie Jacobs, Administrations Coordinator, attended several meetings to discuss further communication between all of the local communities and groups that benefit from the Rock River.



Blackhawk Hills will be working with local RRTI board members to form a Tri-County Committee covering Ogle, Lee, and Whiteside Counties. This Committee will promote recreational activities along the Rock River and the surrounding trails that connect to the river. This will mean promoting the River Fronts and businesses in the area by looking for grant opportunities for the River Fronts, bike trails, water trails, and scenic road routes.

Driftless Area Initiative

Dal Driftless Area Initiative

Blackhawk Hills is one of the six Resource Conservation and Development Councils that originally established the Driftless Area Initiative (DAI). DAI is a multi-state partnership whose goal is to develop a unified voice for natural resource issues in the Driftless Area.

The mission of DAI is to unite organizations and individuals within the Driftless Area of the Upper Mississippi River Basin for collaborative action to enhance and restore this region's ecology, economy, and cultural resources in a balanced, integrated fashion. Della Moen, Blackhawk Hills Council Member, serves as the Secretary for the DAI Board.

Renewable Energy Biomass

Blackhawk Hills, in conjunction with the Driftless Area Initiative (DAI), works to promote production and utilization of perennial biomass crops to meet energy needs while reducing erosion, improving water quality, and benefiting wildlife. The 2nd Annual Biomass Conference was held at the Grand River Center in



Dubuque, IA on November 2-3, 2011. The conference featured speakers and discussion pertaining to direct use biomass applications, feedstock development, feedstock harvest transportation, and biomass market development in the Midwest.

Blackhawk Hills is also working with Jo-Carroll Energy on developing a Biomass Energy Plant that would use 20 percent biomass from local farmers. The University of Minnesota is conducting a study to determine the Forest Biomass Analysis for Jo-Carroll Energy.

Northwest Illinois Grazing Conference



Blackhawk Hills was one of the sponsors of the Northwest Illinois Grazing Conference. The event was held on March 16, 2012. There were 79 participants and of those participants including 56 producers. Three vendors also participated in the event.

The program featured eight speakers. The various topics included fence and watering systems, finances, forage species, pasture renovation, technical and financial assistance, and a grazier panel.

Envirothon

The Soil & Water Conservation Districts in the Blackhawk Hills area hosted the annual Envirothon Competition on March 6, 2012. The Envirothon, a year-long learning process, provides an opportunity for high school students to learn more about the environment. The students are provided with study materials related to aquatics, forestry, soils, wildlife, and non-point source pollution/low impact development. Students use the provided study materials to establish a knowledge base on each of the topics. They also listen to presentations

on each topic given by area professionals on the day of the event. Upon completion of the year-long process, the students are tested on the five subject areas.

This past year, 23 teams participated in the competition. Members of the winning team will each receive a \$400 college scholarship and advance to the Illinois Envirothon Competition to be held in May 2012. The top three schools were:

Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant

Serving as the regional economic development and planning entity, Blackhawk Hills was awarded \$828,569 to be used for Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grants (EECBG) in our area. All attempts were made to ensure projects and funds were spread throughout our six counties.

Twenty-seven communities and local entities of government were awarded grants to assist with projects in community facilities that promoted the conservation of energy. Twenty-five of the projects were completed by the deadline of March 31, 2012. The funds came from stimulus dollars from the U.S. Department of Energy, the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) and the Illinois Association of Regional Councils.

Website Assistance Program

A number of our communities and counties had outdated websites or no websites at all. When Blackhawk Hills received \$10,000 from the Economic Development Administration (EDA), we earmarked the funds to assist communities and counties within our administrative boundaries in the development of websites or updating of current websites. These funds were matched by local investments totaling of over \$15,000.

Nine entities participated in the program including the villages of Davis Junction, Hillcrest, Lena, Mt. Morris, and Steward, the cities of Morrison and Sterling, Lee County, and the Jo-Carroll Local Redevelopment Authority.

Program participants were invited to attend a series of two workshops.

Blackhawk Hills hosted the first workshop on November 4, 2011, with M45 Marketing Services of Freeport, Illinois presenting. Approximately 25 participants attended the event which was designed to assist with the basic construction and development of their website. The second workshop will be held in June 2012 and will center on how to maintain and regularly update the content and activities of a website.

Geographic Information Systems and Information Technology

Blackhawk Hills sponsored roundtable discussions with Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and Information Technology (IT) officials. GIS and IT from county and municipal governments heard presentations on the Win-GIS Consortium. The group's second meeting featured a discussion of legal issues in GIS, specifically those related to open records requests for governmental GIS data. Attendees have included representatives of Boone, Winnebago, and LaSalle counties.

University of Illinois Extension

The University of Illinois Extension offices have undergone reorganization and consolidation. With this change, it has become a major goal of Extension to promote community and economic development education initiatives and cooperate in regionally focused activities. We are working on collaborating on regional initiatives and trying to find ways to partner on projects to help expand our existing resources. Typically, Blackhawk Hills identifies regional service and resource needs while Extension offers the programs to educate and train.

Entrepreneurs and Inventors Club

Blackhawk Hills continues to provide technical and financial assistance to the Blackhawk Hills Entrepreneurs and Inventors (E&I) Club. This club formed in 2005 and is one of the only surviving E&I Clubs in the Northern Illinois and Quad Cities Region. The E&I Club is a place where individuals can meet to share knowledge, experiences, challenges, and ideas and find the resources and tools to attain success in their ventures.

The club continues to meet monthly. Planning took place over this past year to help add new elements to the group, such as finding ways to obtain youth involvement in our local communities. One approach was to begin a partnership with the University of Illinois Extension to determine how local foods can provide entrepreneurial opportunities for youth who would like to be involved in local farmer's markets or co-ops. Another approach was following the framework setup by the Effingham CEO Program. We have been coordinating efforts with the Whiteside Area Career Center and other partners to launch the program to Sauk Valley area high schools in Fall 2013.

Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA)

AmeriCorps VISTA is a national service program designed specifically to fight poverty in rural areas. VISTA members commit to serve full-time for at least one year at a nonprofit organization or local government agency, working to fight illiteracy, improve health services, create businesses, and strengthen community groups. The primary mission is to create or expand programs designed to bring individuals and communities out of poverty.

Blackhawk Hills would like to thank John Huggins for his three years of service to the region as the Blackhawk Hills sponsored AmeriCorp VISTA volunteer. Over the three year period, Blackhawk Hills provided financial assistance to support John in his role with VISTA and his efforts to help improve life in the region.

As a part of John's VISTA service, he provided administrative support for the Entrepreneur and Inventor's Club on behalf of Blackhawk Hills. In this role, John provided meeting coordination, club administration, website maintenance and assistance, and helped create training sessions and workshops for club members.

Partnership for a Connected Illinois

The Partnership for a Connected Illinois (PCI), also known as "Broadband Illinois," is responsible for collecting broadband data across the state, ensuring broadband access in the state's 102 counties, and maximizing the use and impact of broadband connectivity. In late 2011, Blackhawk Hills' Theresa Wittenauer was invited to participate on one of PCI's various regional eTeams; she now serves as a non-profit representative on the northwest Illinois eTeam.

Blackhawk Hills Financials

Funding Distributions

Providing grants assistance and funding to organizations remains an integral part of Blackhawk Hills' efforts. In 2011-2012, the council distributed over \$520,000 throughout the six-county region. Whether a community or organization receives funding is dependent on an organization's ability to engage in the project proposal process, the availability of local match dollars/in-kind contributions, and whether a project meets guidelines established by federal/state governments and other organizations that provide funding.





Annual Update Report on the Blackhawk Hills Regional Council CEDS 2012

Introduction

Blackhawk Hills Regional Council Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) in compliance with 13 CFR Part 303 requires the development of a strategy in order to remain eligible for assistance from the Economic Development Administration (EDA), U. S. Department of Commerce. While a new or revised CEDS must be submitted every 5 years, 13 CFR Part 303.2(d) requires that "Each year thereafter (after initial approval), the planning organization must submit an annual strategy report, acceptable to EDA." This annual report is submitted in compliance with EDA requirements and is intended to inform the public, decision makers and EDA on progress in implementing the Blackhawk Hills Regional Council CEDS.

EDA guidance provides that "the annual report documents the progress achieved on economic development activities, regardless of the source of funding, and reports on changing economic conditions." The annual report should:

- Adjust the CEDS as needed.
- Report on the previous year's economic development activities and any significant changes in the region's economic conditions.
- Evaluate the effectiveness in meeting goals.
- Schedule achievable goals for the coming year.

Current Economic Conditions

The Blackhawk Hills Regional Council Region continues to be impacted by economic conditions that have resulted in deterioration of public service, infrastructure and quality of life of the community at all levels.

Overall Labor Force statistics are updated monthly and annually. Therefore, we are able to obtain new figures for unemployment each year. For the Blackhawk Regional Council, Department of Labor and Bureau of Labor Statistics announced that the average April 2012 unemployment rate for the region was 8.53 percent. This is a slight increase in unemployment for the region by .28 percent from April 2011 to April 2012. The highest unemployment remains to be seen in Ogle County at 10 percent, which is slightly down from the 2011 figure of .6 percent.

In terms of distress levels in the Region, EDA defines a distress-eligible region or community one which has 24 month unemployment rates that are 1% higher than the national rate for the same period or one which is experiencing a per capita income level that is 80% or less of the national level. Currently, the Blackhawk Hills Regional Council Region as a whole is deemed distressed in terms of unemployment rates. All but one of six counties that make up the region is considered independently distressed based upon unemployment figures calculated on www.statsamerica.org.

Furthermore, the Bureau of Economic Analysis classified Ogle County as distressed under the Per Capita Income criteria. The chart below depicts the details of the distress figures.

In terms of layoffs, the Blackhawk Hills Regional Council region has been hit fairly hard over the past decade. Though numbers do not seem as high as some counties throughout IL, our region is fairly rural and smaller in population size. Therefore, when recording layoff figures for over 50 employees for more than 30 days, the numbers certainly have a huge impact on our limited job opportunities. Over the past 10 years, layoff numbers have included: Lee County at 953, Ogle County at 2650, Stephenson County at 2463, and Whiteside County at 1648. Again, these figures only include layoffs that extended beyond 30 days and impacted more than 50 employees for the past 10 years (2000-2010). This also excludes any governmental or agricultural industries, which account for many jobs in our rural area.

Another useful analysis we can use in determining the state and growth of the region economy over the past year is by looking at reported building permit numbers. Overall, the region has seen a 32% drop in the number of building permits being issued by the counties. Similarly, the region has seen a 39% drop in the amount spent on construction costs throughout the counties. Carroll County actually saw a slight increase in both the number of building permits issued, as well as the investment in construction costs. Ogle County saw the largest drop in both categories (U.S. Census Bureau).







Effectiveness in Meeting Goals - Status of Projects

During Fiscal Year 2011-2012, Blackhawk Hills Regional Council has been involved in the following activities as they relate to the Goals listed in the 2008-2013 CEDS document:

Goal I – Utilize long-term planning to improve the conditions, strategies and problem solving capabilities of the District to stay economically competitive. The following objectives have been accomplished.

Website Assistance Program

Blackhawk Hills Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) received from the EDA approximately \$10,000, which we earmarked to assist with regional planning efforts within our administrative boundaries, to be matched by local investments of \$10,000. In response to the calls for assistance with website updating, funding for the 2011 cycle had been earmarked to assist communities and counties with the development or updating of their websites. A number of our communities and counties either have outdated websites or simply lack a website presence at all. Program participants are invited to attend a series of 2 workshops: 1) Preliminary Website Development Basics and 2) Maintenance and Updating a Successful Website. We have 9 entities ready to participate in the program: Davis Junction, Mt. Morris, Lena, Steward, Morrison, Sterling, Lee County, the Savanna LRA and Hillcrest. We hosted the first website design clinic on November 4th with M45 presenting the basics of website design. About 25 participants came to the event and it was designed to assist participants in the construction and development of their website. The second workshop will be held in July 2012 and will highlight the steps needed to actively maintain and regularly update their website.

Regional Council Transformation

We have been in touch with other RPC/COGs, ILARC, IDOT and DCEO to determine what we can do to help expand our services and opportunities and if becoming an RPC is the right choice. The Blackhawk Hills Region is one of the last regional sectors for officially form as a Regional Council. The formation of a Commission would allow for us to offer expanded services related to Comprehensive Planning, Data Research, Mapping and Technical Assistance. In recognition of the importance of regional planning, Regional Councils have become more pertinent for certain federal and state aid programs. Numerous programs and projects in which state or federal interests are involved must be submitted to the area's Regional Council for review or administrations.

We held an information meeting on November 3 and had very good representation from each of our 6-Counties including County Board Chairs/Reps, County Engineers, Council Members, SWCD Reps and Zoning Administrators. A few questions and concerns emerged, and we had to spend months exploring more information that could be shared with the group as we were obtaining more definitive information from our attorney and State Agencies. Come to find out, it has been over 30 years since a Regional Council or RPC has been formed and no one knew the process well enough to give us guidance. It was finally determined that the decision is ultimately up to our County Board Chairs. Therefore, we have presented them with a Draft Resolution to establish the Blackhawk Hills Regional Council.

5-County Economic Study and Recovery Plan

An application was submitted to EDA in September for a study to be conducted by NIU on Wages, Labor Shed and Clusters for the counties of Carroll, Ogle, Whiteside and Lee. Stephenson County has contributed funds to the project to also be included in portions of the study. The goal is to have information on what kinds of businesses the region should ultimately be trying to market to and what labor base they have to support them. This project is a reaction to the amount of layoffs and industrial closings we have had in the area. EDA has funded the project and currently an advisory committee is working to set up the parameters of the surveys and to help lead the project. Blackhawk Hill's staff is participating on this advisory committee. It is expected to take 18 months to complete.

Western Whiteside County Business Climate Analysis

The cities of Fulton, Morrison, and Prophetstown have been collaborating on an economic development assessment and on strategies to help strengthen the potential of West Whiteside County. As part of these efforts, the Center surveyed businesses in Fulton, Morrison and Prophetstown (Spring 2010) to determine strengths of the region, obstacles to expanding production, future plans, and actions that could be taken to improve the local business climate. The group has come up with recommended actions for West Whiteside County to help with short-term economic stabilization and longer-term economic growth. It outlines a set of objectives, strategies and action steps that can provide the WWC project partners with a framework for improving and expanding business opportunities within their communities. Area leaders and economic development professionals have been asked to come together and begin collaboration with the Clinton area on how we can better implement/revamp existing programs to better serve small business in our region.

Goal 2 – Assist with the improvement of community infrastructure (water, sewer, roads, telecommunications) to provide for new economic growth, as well as support existing businesses. The following objectives have been accomplished.

Broadband Task Force

Access to broadband fiber in northwestern Illinois emerged as a primary and serious goal of the group of our region. The Regional CEDS group felt there was an immense need to continue to explore, educate and bring grassroots pressure for governmental spending to access and expand existing broadband infrastructure in our 6-county region. In a response to a federal and state effort to fund large REGIONAL projects, the City of Rockford/Boone County and LaSalle County joined forces with Blackhawk Hills (Counties of Jo Daviess, Stephenson, Carroll, Ogle, Whiteside and Lee in NW Illinois) to apply for the funding. The Governor's announcement stated "Northern Illinois University (NIU), on behalf of the Illinois Broadband Opportunity Partnership – Northwest Region (IBOP-NW), received \$46.1 million in federal dollars matched with \$14 million in state capital funds and \$8.5 million in private funding for the project.

The regular Broadband Board has met monthly over the past year. We have also had a number of other meetings related to Broadband over the past few months including the Communications Committee and a number of special meetings with NIU concerning future contracts. The Communications Committee has worked on media related items and printed brochures for the project. There have been a number of meetings happening with CAIs throughout the region, as well as general presentations about the project to different entities. A ground breaking was held at SVCC on August 29th and was very well attended by the construction companies, local officials and the Governor's Office.

Currently, approximately 275+ miles of fiber have been installed, while 420+ miles of fiber duct have been constructed in the 9-county region. iFiber's construction companies are working in all counties in the Blackhawk Hills region. Crews will continue to work through most of the winter months as weather permitted. PirTano Construction Company began blowing fiber into buried micro-duct on Route 52 south of Sublette the week of December 1st. Updates on this project can always be viewed at ifiber.org.

Rochelle Project E-Rail

An application was submitted for review to EDA for the City of Rochelle. This project consisted of improving the municipal water, sanitary sewer, communications and electric utilities, as well as expanding the Rochelle Dual Access Railroad to the Project Benefit Area consists of 540 acres of land located in the southeast corner of the City of Rochelle. Although this land is close to I-88, I-39, and the Union Pacific Railroad's Global III intermodal facility, the area surrounding the Project Benefit Area lacks the essential infrastructure to allow for it to reach its development potential. The new facilities are required to service the growing industrial area in Rochelle. The City has received approval for this grant and has scheduled a ground-breaking for July 19, 2012.

Hillcrest Sewer Conversion Schedule

Assisting them with sewer issues and finding funds to transition from individual septic to a sewer system. We brought together the Engineer and Rural Development to discuss what funding and assistance options may be available to them. After determining they were not eligible for the traditional grants, we helped the Village brainstorm a creative conversion/transition schedule to make the project more feasible and possibly grant eligible in phases.

Goal 3 – Work with and assist economic development professionals and organizations in our region. The following objectives have been accomplished.

VISTA

John Huggins' third, and final, year of VISTA service ended with Blackhawk Hills Entrepreneurs and Inventors Club on November 20, 2011. John has done an excellent job again this year, continuing to strengthening the E&I Club and retain its membership, developing an Artisan's Club, and building sustainability in our region. John has agreed to stay with the Club and help manage the regular meetings.

Website Development Workshop #I

We hosted a website design clinic on November 4th with M45 out of Freeport presenting the basics of website design. About 20-25 participants came to the event.

LRA Tenant's Meeting

Blackhawk Hills assisted in organizing a tenant's meeting at the LRA to bring together the tenants, LRA staff and the board to discuss the immediate needs of conducting business at the site, infrastructure needs and what issues should be tackled first. We hoped this would be a first of many meetings, assisting the staff and tenants with better communication and to help them work together to advance the operations at the LRA. Additional meetings have been scheduled to explore the issue of expanding a natural gas line out to the property, as well as how to utilize/expand the broadband infrastructure throughout the facilities.

U-W Platteville University Center Application

Blackhawk Hills was a participating organization with the University of Wisconsin-Platteville, Tri County Economic Development Alliance (TCEDA), Southwest Wisconsin Technical College and Highland Community College in applying for FY 2011 University Center Economic Development Program Competition funding through the Economic Development Administration (EDA), U.S. Department of Commerce. We worked together to develop the proposed University Center which would have allowed us all to implement comprehensive strategies that would support new businesses, new jobs, expand innovative entrepreneurship and increase our talent pool and workforce in our service region. Blackhawk Hills had collaborated with the other partners to support the overall mission of this Center and work toward the creation of a Small Business Development Center (SBDC) to meet the needs of our regional constituents. The application was ultimately turned down by EDA.

Goal 4 – Encourage local economic and community development initiatives by providing necessary support and assistance as needed. The following objectives have been accomplished.

Entrepreneurs and Inventors Club

Blackhawk Hills continues to provide technical and financial assistance to the Entrepreneurs and Inventors Club (the only surviving E&I Club in the Northern IL and Quad Cities Region). The club met monthly and planning is still taking place to help add new components to the E&I Club and to find ways to get youth involved.

One avenue we are exploring is a partnership with UI- Extension and local foods to provide mentors to youth who want to get involved in farmer's markets or co-ops. Another option we are exploring is following the framework setup by the Effingham CEO Program.

TCOC

Blackhawk Hills' Administrations Coordinator has served for 8 years on the Tri-County Opportunities Council's (TCOC) Governing Board. TCOC is a Community Action Agency serving the nine Illinois counties of Bureau, Carroll, LaSalle, Lee, Marshall, Ogle, Putnam, Stark and Whiteside. TCOC works to better focus available local, state, private, and federal resources to assist low-income individuals and families to acquire useful skills and knowledge to gain access to new opportunities and achieve economic self-sufficiency. TCOC oversees the following programs: Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), Foster Grandparents, Homemakers, Head Start/ Early Head Start/Migrant Head Start, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and Weatherization and Housing Program.

Lee County Tourism Council

Staff actively serves on the LCTC and helps with planning activities when needed. The Council meets on a monthly basis and was focusing on the Reagan 100th Birthday Celebration over the past year. LCTC also works very closely with the regional tourism agency called Blackhawk Waterways CVB. Meetings were held monthly. Blackhawk Hills was also recently awarded the annual STAR Award by LCTC for its dedication to the region and its involvement in organizing a number of active groups, agencies and councils in our district.

Goal 5 – Facilitate and participate in regional networking activities. The following objectives have been accomplished.

NWIL Workforce Investment Board

The WIB met on a bi-monthly basis throughout the year. Staff has served on this board for the past 4 years and continues to remain actively involved in it. Recently, our role has included reenergizing the network between workforce development and economic development by bridging the gaps of communication that often occur between economic development leaders and the privacy of the manufacturing sector. We also serve on the Business and Economic Development Partnership Committee, which has been exploring ways to merge partnerships between Business, Workforce Development, and Economic Development.

University of Illinois Extension

University of IL Extension offices have undergone reorganization and consolidation. With this change, it has become a major goal of theirs to promote community and economic development initiatives, and cooperate in regionally focused activities.

We have been working on collaborating on a number of regional initiatives and trying to find ways we can partner on projects to help expand our existing resources.

ILARC

Our organization continues to remain active participants in ILARC and attend the regularly scheduled meetings, as well as other events they promote. We are able to share their information with our region when an issue or topic is something that will immediately impact our district. We have worked with them very closely over the past 6 months in our efforts to explore our options of becoming a Regional Council.

Goal 6 - Update and maintain the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) document. The following objectives have been accomplished.

EDA CEDS 5-Year Report

The EDA CEDS 5-Year Report has been adopted by our Council and submitted for the time period 2008-2013. An annual update has also been approved and submitted for the current year. We are currently working on our annual update and beginning to strategize the construction of our 5-year plan.

Regional CEDS Meetings

The Regional CEDS Committee met on a quarterly basis for this time period covered. We are still averaging 20 to 25 participants at each meeting. These meetings were used to give updates on the Broadband Initiative, provide funding updates in regards to USDA and other sources, and to provide updates on regional projects/ issues. We have provided presentation from University of IL Extension, iFiber, the Quad Cities Regional Economic Development Authority, and the Midwest Intellectual Property Management Institute.

County CEDS Meetings

Staff attends a number of individual County CEDS Meetings in each of our counties to help share information at a local level and give updates on projects and initiatives our office is undertaking. These meetings are held monthly or bi-monthly.

Other Regional Department Meetings

We meet on a regular basis with our County Board Chairman, as well as our County Zoning Administrators to help share information and discuss current issues they may be facing. These meetings are bi-monthly and very well attended. Staff is also bringing back the Regional GIS Administrators and IT Meetings to help assist with the initiatives of the Broadband Project we are carrying out. All of these meetings serve as a way for our organization to help the region when immediate needs arise or help us determine what type of assistance may be needed.

Goal 7 – Promote and encourage sustainability focused activities that conserve land, manage water resources, and stimulate energy efficiency projects.

EECBGP

Serving as the regional economic development and planning entity, Blackhawk Hills RC&D was awarded \$750,000 to be used for Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grants in our District. 27 communities and local entities of government were awarded grants through our office to assist with projects in community facilities that will promote the conservation of energy. All projects and paperwork have been completed by the deadline of March 2012.

Community Gardens

Community gardens are part of a growing trend in self-sufficiency and the desire to eat locally grown produce. Hundreds of community gardens thrive nationwide as a way to provide gardening space for those who don't have suitable space of their own and who wish to grow their own produce. Blackhawk Hills has assisted with a number of community gardening efforts in the region and has partnered with the University of IL Extension office to host a workshop and roundtable on "Creating and Maintaining Sustainable Community Gardens." The event will cover topics such as the basics of creating a community garden, choosing the proper cultivation site for your growing, waste management planning, and what you should consider growing for the remainder of this planting season. There will also be a roundtable discussion on various topics to be addressed by civic leaders who are currently managing very successful community gardens throughout our region. We are currently planning the workshop for July 27, 2012.

Local Foods Initiative

A number of meetings have been popping up in the region concerning a push to promote Local Foods. Primarily in JoDaviess and Stephenson County, but interests are also high in Whiteside and Carroll Counties. However, SWWRPC recently received a RBOG Grant from USDA to push this same issue and are looking to partner with us and with our 2 northern counties. Our office and UI-Extension are looking for opportunities to help coordinate all the efforts to make one strong push for Local Foods in our region. It has become a goal of ours to increase awareness of the MarketMaker Program, promoted by Extension, to local farmers and producers. It's a web-based resource that connects farmers, fishermen, processors, distributors, food retailers, and consumers. We see this as an economic generator for our area, as agri-tourism continues to soar in northwestern IL. This meeting also opened up the doors to the possibility of working closer with the County Farm Bureaus on a regular basis. We have a lot we could collaborate on in the economic area of local farming.

Objectives for the Upcoming Year

The overall objective for the upcoming year is to continue to implement the adopted Goals found in our 5-Year CEDS Document, which is only 3 year old. All appropriate projects contained in the CEDS will be pursued by the various entities in our region, and a complete list of the projects is attached. Furthermore, we will collaborate regionally on those goals that focus heavily on the following items:

- Strengthen our collaborative regional partnerships, as well as our public/private partnerships;
- Aggressively promote renewable energy and environmentally sustainable development, being mindful of land conservation and water management;
- Determine our fullest potential use of the new Broadband Infrastructure being installed in our region as a result of our recent NTIA grant;
- Continue to work with the entities currently submitting applications to EDA for funding in our region;
- Create a stronger relationship and partnership with local and regional utility companies to promote business development and expansions;
- Diversify local industry and create jobs to reach global competiveness;
- Improve quality of life for residents and business leaders in economically distressed and underserved communities;
- Aggressively promote our agency's ability to write and administer grants;
- Continue to provide any assistance and regional coordination to the Federal Bureau of Prisons to bring light to the use of the Thomson Correctional Facility;
- Introduce new ideas, create a web component and improve membership in the E&I Club to help re-energize the group and help reach out to youth;
- Continue to push for the implementation of the youth Creating Entrepreneurial Opportunities (CEO) Program in the local high schools;
- Explore the idea of securing a Revolving Loan Fund and gain experience in administering a successful program.
